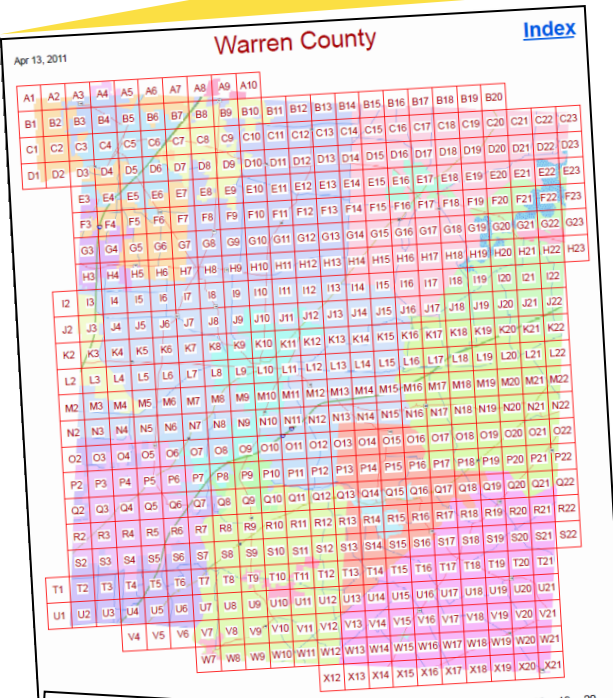

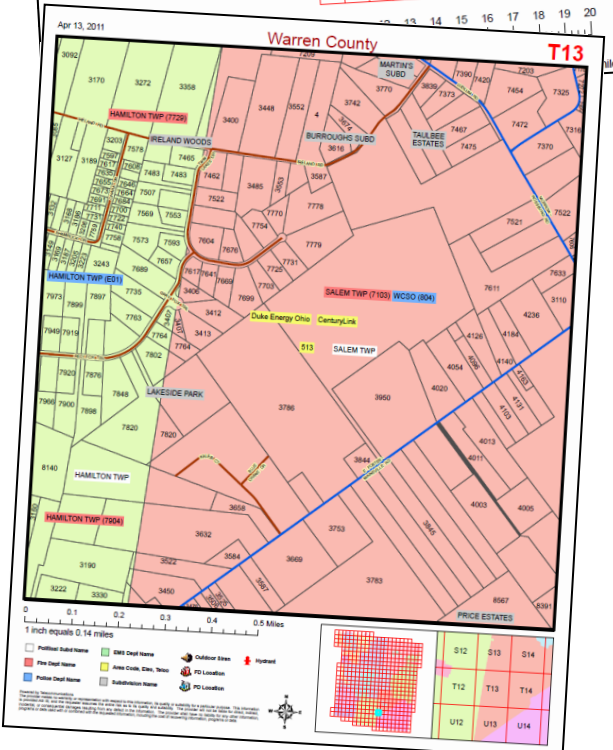

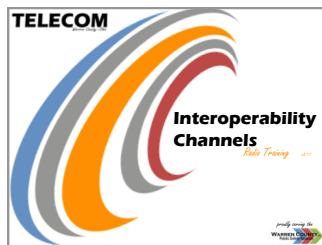
Ever wonder how CAD maps are updated with new construction and roads? The answer is Don Sebastianelli, Application Analyst II on Telecom's CAD/RMS team! He keeps up with changes via the County Engineers office, political subdivisions, dispatcher findings, phone companies, and satellite aerial images. He then draws in streets (and over 4000 waterways just this year) by hand in ArcMap which gets uploaded into the Computer Aided Dispatch software every two or three months. This ensures that when an incident happens, our system recognizes the location & you know how to get there quickly and safely! These same maps are available to you as PDFs to save to your MDC or computer. The best part - every file is hyperlinked to automatically navigate you to other zones and areas.

2011 Improvements

- Subdivision layer - Layers above it must be 'turned off' to see it. Turning off layers below also make it easier to view.
- A separately zipped Greene County Map.
- Fire zones were redrawn for JEMS, Mason, and Hamilton Township.

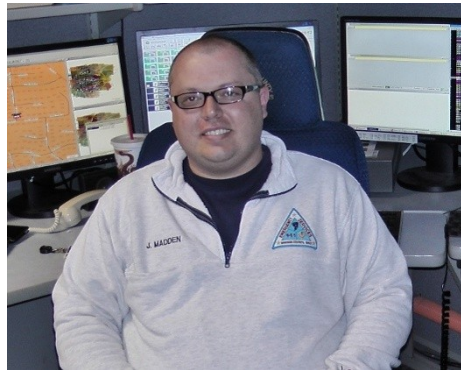

Dispatcher Jesse Madden Nominated for Solid Gold Award



The Ohio chapters of APCO and NENA work together to recognize the outstanding work performed by public safety communications personnel. This comes in the form of The Ohio 9-1-1 Gold Star Awards program. Jesse Madden was one of just 10 state dispatchers nominated for this award, and recognized at the Gold Star Awards Luncheon in Columbus on April 13th.



Madden's nomination came in response to an incident he dispatched in March 2010. A man named Troy Wolverton came to his ex-girlfriend's apartment and stabbed her to death while her 8-year old son watched. Jesse heard Lebanon PD put it out on their primary and he immediately hit the alert tones, advising any of our units to look for the suspect's vehicle. The suspect fled northbound on State Route 123 and because Jesse got units in position so quickly, they spotted Wolverton in Red Lion and went in pursuit towards Franklin. Once they got on NB I-75, Jesse alerted Springboro and Franklin units up ahead. Wolverton was stopped just south of the Springboro/Franklin exit where he took his own life. Had Jesse not taken the kind of initiative that he had, chances are good that the outcome would not have been the same and the suspect would have slipped away. Great work Jesse, and thank you for protecting the safety of Warren County and its neighbors!

LEADS Reminder

POLICIES & PLANS

The **LEADS Security Policy** is required by LEADS and will clarify various security precautions & disciplinary action for violations committed by certified operators or practitioners. The policy was presented at April's Law Communications Workgroup Meeting for review and discussion.

The **Storm Dispatching Plan** is a policy to alleviate confusion during extreme weather events by reducing the volume of radio traffic and ensuring proper processing of true emergency incidents. It defines the procedure that Dispatch will follow in handling non-emergency calls as well as storm-related incidents. It was reviewed and discussed at April's Fire Communications Workgroup Meeting.

Personnel Changes

During the last week of March, six interviews were conducted to fill the open Communications Supervisor position. The commissioners recently approved the recommendation to promote Jason Shatto to Dispatch Supervisor.



Also, six applicants were given the Communications Emergency Operator pre-employment test at One Stop. Administered by Sue Spencer, Personnel Officer from the Office of Management and Budget, the test measures the applicants' computer and typing proficiency, knowledge of Warren County area geography, multitasking skills, memory, and general aptitude. The Communications Center currently has one position open for an operator.

Japan Disaster's Possible Effects on U.S

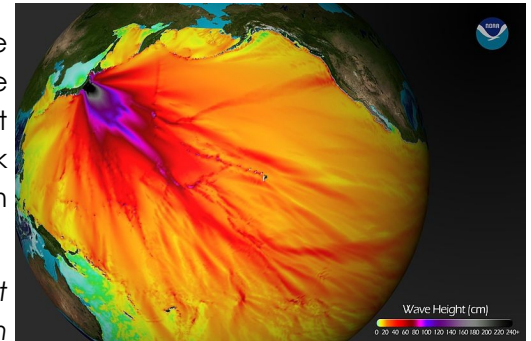
Part of EMA's job is to be aware of emergencies around the world, and their potential affect on our community/safety. Check out some effects in America from the disaster in Japan.

One's Trash is Another's Treasure This saying rang true on Saturday, April 2nd when Wayne Twp FD hosted a Live Burn Training for county fire departments - and Telecom was there to capture all the action!

The Setting: an old farmhouse on Jeffery Road; the childhood home of a little girl who built her now home just next door, on her parents' land. After her mother and father passed away, the house sat vacant for a few years, and the time came to lay it to rest. Rather than demolishing it with heavy equipment, the family turned the home over to Wayne Twp FD for the benefit of the community's fire departments, a treasure for firefighters who haven't yet experienced a true fire.

The Training: live scenario fires in various rooms of the home. Firefighters were grouped into teams, rotating through responsibilities that included entering the home, studying the trends of the fire, then ultimately extinguishing it.

Swift Water Rescue Training

We know who comes to our rescue for a burglary, house fire, or car accident. But have you stopped to think, "Who's going to save me in the water?" Thanks to members of Ohio's State Water Technical Advisory Board, a group of Warren County Firefighters endured a four-day training course in March. **The Setting:** the county's popular summer 'watering holes' - Little Miami River and Caesar Creek State Park. **The Training:** Classroom instruction on the characteristics of water, a swim test at the YMCA, and defensive swimming techniques. Boat handling on flat water at the Caesar Creek State Park. Defensive swimming, shallow water rescue techniques on the little Miami River, and ground school demonstrating a movable control point. A scheduled water release from the Caesar Creek dam allowing the students to train in moving water at approximately 1200 ft³ / second and live water rescues.

Woman Rescued from Flooding Vehicle

Wednesday, April 20th

The importance of Water Rescue Training became evident in the late morning of April 20th when Dispatcher Tonya Shutts answered a call from a 75-year old woman reporting, "There's water in here... Hello, I'm floating down the river in my car! The water's coming in fast, up to my knees!" The driver was heading south out of Waynesville and just went through the covered bridge when she entered high waters and was taken away by the current. To make matters more urgent for Dispatch and Rescue, the driver had a brace on her leg, making her unable to bend out of the car or swim. While rescue worked on reaching the woman and freeing



her, the call lasted close to 20 minutes. Shutts attempted to keep the stranded driver calm, asking pertinent information and reassuring the woman that "by hook or by crook, we'll get there!" The driver was getting increasingly nervous as minutes ticked away, asking, "Can I call my children?"

When Turtlecreek Fire was finally able to maneuver themselves to the flooding vehicle, the woman reported water approaching her neck, audibly shaking, "My shoulder's cold"... understandable as she was in freezing waters. The last 3 minutes of the 9-1-1 call were

especially scary for Shutts as the driver quit responding to questions. Luckily, all was OK as the boat had reached the car and the elderly woman turned her attention to being rescued.

This real-life rescue is a perfect example of why pertinent training and quick response is crucial. For both the Dispatcher and Rescue Team, great job on performing your duties to the best of your abilities, and saving the life of a fellow citizen.

National Electrical Safety Month

An estimated 51,000 home fires involving electrical failure or malfunction claimed 500 lives, 1,400 injuries, and \$1.3 billion in property damage last year! Electrical fires are not the only cause for concern. Statistics from the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission show that 400 people are electrocuted in the US each year. Make your home/office/church/garage safe with the following tips:

- Install GFCIs (Ground Fault Circuit Interrupters) on your outlets to stop overcharged lines in their tracks!
- Install plastic safety covers in unused receptacles to keep your children's wandering fingers from getting zapped!
- Unplug power cords by the plug, NOT the cord - this keeps the cord from separating and exposing live wires.
- Check all electrical cords for fraying or cut lines. This can spark a fire or allow moisture into the wiring.
- Posted bulb wattages aren't recommendations... don't overload your lamps!
- Walk your family through a home inspection - show them the dangers and that you care about their safety!

GO 'GREEN' - THE SALAD KIND!

- Eating salad increases your fiber intake, lowering cholesterol and constipation.
- You feel fuller, eat less and lose weight. Eat salad prior to your main course & reduce the number of calories you ultimately consume.
- Vegetables and fruit are rich with nutrients and vitamins that help you perform your job and daily activities.
- Salad can catapult you to your recommended daily veggie intake (5 servings).
- Green veggies (spinach, green beans, asparagus) provide your body with high levels of antioxidants which lower your chance of illnesses such as cancer.
- Salad increases your intake of good fats - olive oils, avocados, and nuts help your body absorb protective phytochemicals.
- It sets a great example for your children!

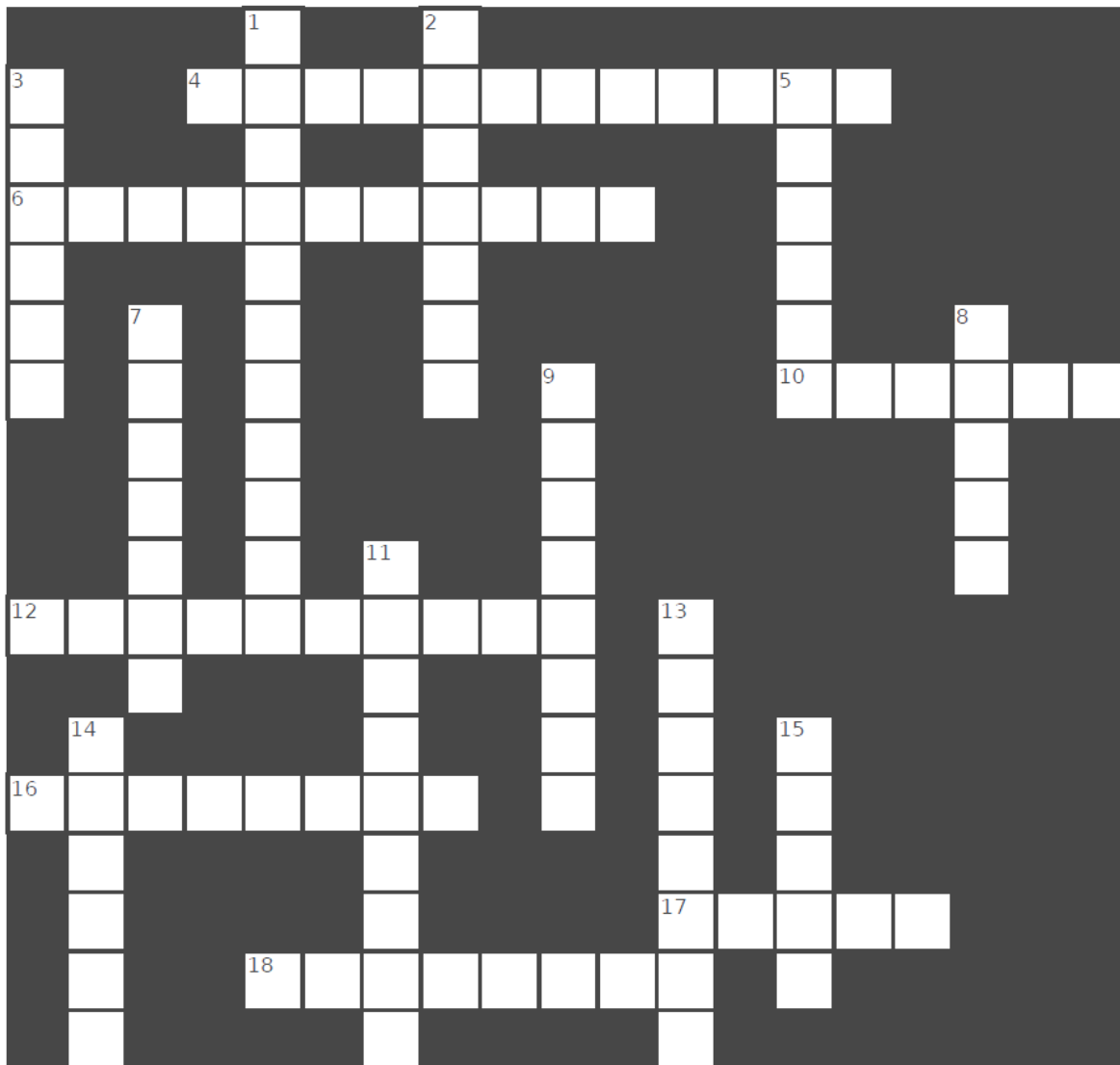
